# 2023 Annual Report to Our Friends

AST YEAR WAS ANOTHER successful and busy year for the Council. We kept our pledge to our mission faithfully. More importantly we managed to attract some new, and often younger, members. We realize we need to bring in younger members to join our ranks if our important work is to continue. Last year saw a handful of stalwarts, including two founding Council members, retire from Rochester winters and move South. A strong, vibrant influx of new faces is maybe

We are aware of the importance of using what has been given to us effectively and efficiently so that we are deserving of your continued support. Approximately ninety-seven percent of our funds are expended on our focus group because we are 100% volunteer.

# Marine Corps Birthday Balls

ing of the first piece of birthday cake from the oldest Marine to the youngest Marine. The Council supports the Reserve Unit Balls so that our youngest Marines can attend without financial hardship. This year's 248TH Balls were all a resounding success.

help of many people otherwise not connected to the Corps, succeeded wonderfully. The annual *Marine Corps Toys for Tots* program, done in partnership with the Marine Corps League, the Cooper Marines, the Salvation Army and the Holley Hell-

hounds collected over 121,000 toys that were given to over 54,000 children in eight contiguous counties. The campaign was very successful in maintaining the tradition of *Every child deserves a little Christmas*.'

The annual *Toys for Tots* program wouldn't be near-

ly as successful without a large group of volunteers. These volunteers deliver empty boxes, retrieving them when they are full and then spending countless hours sorting and packing toys for delivery at the warehouse. We want to say 'Thank You' to our volunteers. Without them our mission would be impossible.

#### **MCCC** Foundation

The *MCCC Foundation Ltd.*, 501 (c)3 charitable organization and fundraising arm of the Marine Corps Coordinating Council has allowed us to tap into other revenue generating resources as well as other entities whose charitable giving is restricted to non-profits with a 501(c) 3 designation. Like the Council, the foundation is 100% volunteer with no paid staff and very low operating expenses.

### **Family Day Support**

The Marine Reserve Centers we serve in Buffalo, Syracuse as well as Erie, PA all have annual *Family Days*. At

these events Marines and their families have a picnic and fun day. The Council helps out with food and a Bounce House for the kids. In addition we provide many door prizes in the form of Wegmans



Gift Cards. We are very flexible in providing family support.

#### The Chairman's Personal Touch

Our chairman Mike Chaba is one of our most consistent and dependable sources of help. Time and again he has exhibited an ideal mix of compassion and practicality. So much so that Mike is Council-authorized to provide help to those we serve up to a certain point on his own immediate judgment and experience. The immediate prompt response is a source of pride for us. With larger amounts we have an email system where members approve financial help as a group. The Council never hands out money but rather pays outstanding bills.

Mike's report on his activities during the preceding month. Often it is obvious that his efforts have gone way beyond paying some bill; dispensing funds to solve a problem. He has spent time listening and commiserating with a troubled individual. For most of us our participation is limited to our monthly meetings and the occasional fund-raising effort like the once-a-year Leatherneck Open. With Mike it's a matter of the personal touch. Which he brings to this monthly. We are thankful he is the human face of this organization. Otherwise we risk being just dollars and cents.

#### Who We Help

#### Still Efficient

Our best tradition is still having no paid staff. We still are 100% volunteer. Our members even buy their own gas when we have to travel. Ninety-seven percent of our funds go directly to our programs. It always has. And it always will.

#### **Near Instant Response**

The Council also supplements the *Naval Relief Fund* for those Reservists who have a family emergency that needs immediate assistance. The Council can address such emergencies much faster than usual channels, often within 24 hours of notification.

# Marines Helping Marines—2023

Instigated by the late Council member John Gay our Marines Helping Marines program has continued to be a challenge. We try to fund solutions to problems and issues.

#### Marines Helping Marines for 2023

**1.** Twenty-eight Marine Reservists went for training out of state. Through administrative misinformation their stay at an unauthorized hotel ended up costing each an additional unanticipated \$200. The Council reimbursed these Reservists that cost. **2.** The Chairman was contacted by 'We Soldier On.' A Marine veteran lost his job and was behind on rent, RG&E bill and car insurance. The Council helped out with these payments. **3.** A Marine veteran passed away, a 'Go Fund Me' account was set up for a scholarship for his daughter. The

Council contributed to the scholarship fund. 4. A Marine veteran's father, who was an Army veteran, was injured in a motorcycle accident. The Council provided financial aid while he was recovering. **5.** A Marine veteran with PTSD was unable to work and was struggling financially after a divorce. The Council helped him with his mortgage, car payment and RG&E bill. 6. An unemployed Navy veteran with no car and in deep financial trouble had a baby with serious health conditions. His subsidized housing rent and RG&E bill was covered by the Council. **7.** A Marine veteran asked for help from the Council. He sent a thank-you note after his rent and cell phone bills were paid and is happy to be working again. 8. An activeduty Marine Reservist received some assistance from the Council after struggling financially. 9. An active-duty Marine Reservist discovered after, reporting for duty, that he didn't have enough money for bus fare to return home. The Council paid for his return bus ticket. **10.** A Marine veteran requested financial help. The Council purchased wood pellets for her wood stove and a new refrigerator. 11. A Navy veteran with health problems was helped by the Council who paid his rent. **12.** A Marine veteran with health problems was helped by the Council who paid his rent. 13. A Marine veteran was assisted after his daughter contacted the Council. He received help when his rent and cell phone bill were paid by the Council.
